What happens now?

Once the death has been verified, the nursing staff will respectfully prepare for the transfer to the mortuary, to a place nominated by the family, or in an Advance Care Plan. In this preparation, any religious or cultural customs will be observed and dignity will be maintained throughout.

Our mortuary is located at a local funeral directors where, if you wish, you may view your loved one. Their details are:

Evershed will be able to help with funeral arrangements or assist you in contacting a funeral director of your choice.

The death must be registered within **five days** at the register office. within the borough where the death took place unless the Coroner is investigating the cause of death.

Deaths that occur at the Royal Hospital for Neuro-disability are registered with:

The process for registering a death is as follows:

- The Medical Certificate of Cause of Death (MCCD), which is issued by the certifying doctor, will be emailed to the Register Office.
 - From April 2023, doctors in the UK are required to refer all deaths to the Medical Examiner. This may mean a slight delay in issuing the MCCD and the Medical Examiner may call you.
- 2. Please contact the Register Office to confirm that they have received the certificate before making an appointment.
- Book an appointment online once the Register Office has confirmed they have the necessary paperwork. Appointments are available Monday to Friday between 9am and 4.30pm.

In some circumstances, the Coroner will need to conduct a routine inguest. In other cases, the Coroner may need to make more enquiries. In this case, there may be a delay in the delivery of the MCCD, affecting funeral plans. If you would like more information about this, please ask.

Give yourself time, and try to avoid making any major changes or decisions. Most of them can wait for a while.
